


The waste sector is the bedrock of the circular economy.








Our sector is critical for a functioning circular economy to flourish.





By 2030, our sector could be 500,000 strong if circular economy measures are maximised.





What roles will exist in a future resources and waste sector within the circular economy?





CIWM published a Skills Report in 2023, looking at the skills needed by the sector in the future.

2023 - 2030 - Near term:

- Roles associated with policy development and implementation
- Design of products and packaging
- Regulation and compliance
- Collections and operations
- Reuse and repair including volunteers

2030 – 2035, Medium Term

- Circular economy specialists
- Renewable energy specialists
- Change managers
- Industrial reuse and repair
- Chemists and material scientists

2035 – 2040, Long Term

- Net zero carbon capture and storage
- Automation
- Al





By 2040, the sector will have transformed dramatically in both scale and structure.





In same survey of the sector, people were asked about the scale of change in roles going forward and what areas these would be in.

- Estimated new roles by 2044 included:
- 21,000 in collection, sorting and treatment
- 140,000 in repair and reuse
- 9,000 additional consultancy roles
- 6,500 more regulatory positions
- 15,000 more roles in vehicle related areas, such as manufacture, repair and end-oflife vehicles
- 11,000 more roles in circular economy business models such as refill and rental


